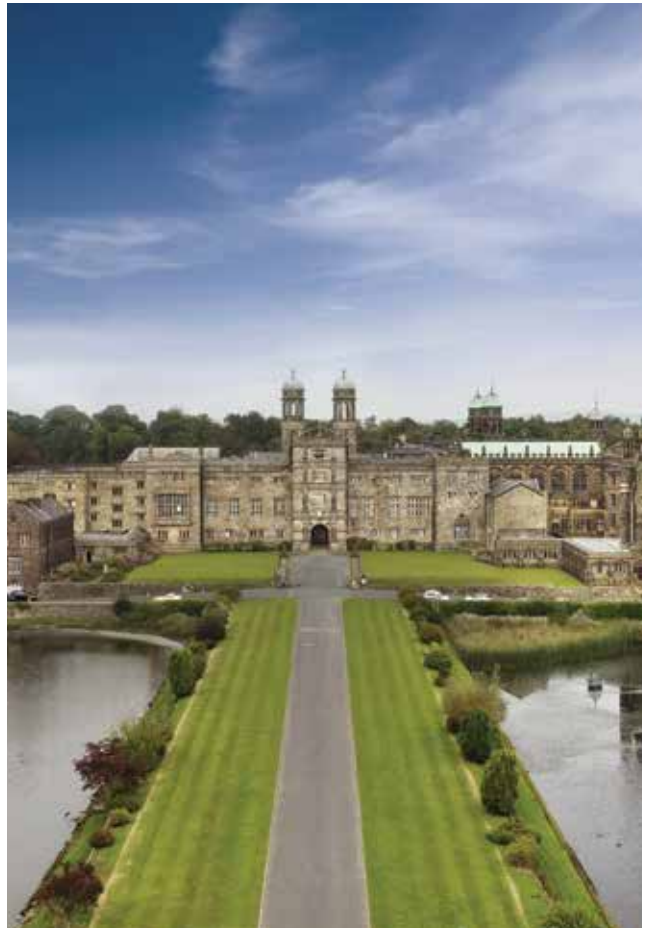

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EYFS - Nursery and Reception

Our EYFS (Nursery and Reception) children will be following the Early Years and Foundation Stage Curriculum.

This covers seven areas of learning that understand the key points of early years development and allow teachers to focus on each child's individual needs. Children will primarily learn through a play-based approach, where the environment is regularly adapted to challenge them. The teachers act as facilitators in learning through their interactions with the children.

Some systematic teaching of English and Mathematics will take place in Reception to give the children the key skills they need to learn from the world around them. Primarily, our goal is to develop the children's characteristics of effective learning so that they are curious, attentive, creative and critical thinkers, ready for their next stage of learning.

THE INTERNATIONAL PRIMARY CURRICULUM

The International Primary Curriculum (IPC) is a comprehensive, thematic, creative curriculum for 5-11-year olds, with a clear process of learning and with specific learning goals for every subject, for international mindedness and for personal learning.

The IPC has been designed to ensure rigorous learning and at the same time, help teachers make all learning exciting, active and meaningful for children. Learning with the IPC takes a global approach, helping children to connect their learning to where they are living now as well as looking at the learning from the perspective of people in other countries. The IPC is used by schools in more than 92 countries around the world.

The IPC structure is divided into three mileposts where all of the themes are mapped out individually.

MILEPOST 1 - YEARS 1 AND 2

MILEPOST 2 - YEARS 3 AND 4

MILEPOST 3 - YEARS 5 AND 6



Pre-Prep (Year 1 and 2)

Pre-Prep provides a bridge between our Early Years and Prep departments. Educational research clearly illustrates that children at this age still rely heavily on real experiences to cement their learning.

Therefore, much of the work they do involves practical activities. They use our Jesuit Pupil Profile learning virtues: Curious and Active, Intentional and Prophetic, Attentive and Discerning, Learned and Wise to approach independent challenges. Pupils will develop their academic learning through a systematic phonics programme, focused writing development with Talk for Writing, and deepen their Maths Learning through the mastery approach. They also access specialist lessons in Music, French, Bahasa, Mandarin, PE & Swimming.

Prep and Elements (Year 3 to 6)

Pupils will begin to establish their independence and sense of responsibility in preparation for the transition to Senior School.

During this four-year period, pupils delve deeper into the core subjects of English, Mathematics and Science, as well as the International Primary Curriculum (IPC). Our outstanding teachers focus on involving the pupils as active participants in their learning through discussions, planning, action and reflection.

At this stage, pupils discover their passions, strengths and how to succeed in areas they may find more challenging. They cement their understanding of the pastoral virtues of the Jesuit Pupil Profile: Loving and Compassionate, Hopeful and Faithfilled, Eloquent and Truthful, Generous and Grateful. This is accomplished through a pastoral framework, woven throughout the academic curriculum. Their curriculum is further enhanced with additional specialist subjects that now include Art, Drama and ICT.

Assessments are carried out informally and regularly through feedback from teachers and peer editing, as well as formally through integrated progress checks and more formal assessments at the end of each academic year.





Figures to Lower Grammar (Year 7 to 9)

Through a broad curriculum, pupils are able to practise and refine their collaborative, communicative, creative, reflective, independent questioning and research skills through an inquiry-based approach to learning.

Grammar and Syntax

Year 10 -11 (IGCSE)

All Grammar and Syntax (Year 10 -11) pupils will take a core curriculum of subjects together with various options. The IGCSE years set a strong foundation for all pupils with the aim to maximise their academic achievements, whilst taking their first step towards choosing a potential career.

Pupils will select up to a maximum of 10 IGCSE subjects. All pupils must select the two core subjects, at least 1 language and either 3 separate sciences or the Co-ordinated Science course. They can then choose up to 5 other options from the humanities or creative blocks.

(Year 12 - 13)



Shaping future leaders

Poetry and Rhetoric (Sixth Form) pupils at Stonyhurst are the leaders of the school community and are expected to uphold extremely high expectations. Service to others is a key foundation on which a Jesuit education rests and our pupils will be actively involved with a range of projects at school and in the wider community. In Poetry and Rhetoric, pupils will receive the personal support and rigorous academic excellence required to excel in the A-level examinations.

Life beyond the classroom

Life in Poetry and Rhetoric is fast paced and varied. While we encourage our pupils to work hard academically, life at Stonyhurst International School Penang extends far beyond the classroom. We recognise the importance of developing the whole individual so that our boys and girls are well-rounded, confident and ready to succeed in the real world.





Creativity

We believe that a broad holistic education is the best gift we can give a child in preparation for an ever-changing world. As well as excellent scholars, we expect our pupils to experience all aspects of the creative arts during their educational journey.

The creative life of the schools will be rich and varied; our dramatic productions, musicals and concerts will challenge pupils to develop their many talents, and enable them to grow in confidence.





An Energetic Life

Sports will play an important part in the life of the school. All pupils will be involved in regular physical education and swimming lessons and we will offer a wide range of Co-curricular activities to cater to the interests of all pupils.

CATHOLIC FAITH

Our faith is at the centre of everything we do at Stonyhurst. As a community we seek to do everything *Ad Maiorem Dei Gloriam* (for the greater glory of God), so that our faith informs the high standards we strive to achieve from day to day.

THE LINES

The Line system is one of the pillars of Stonyhurst's unique customs and traditions. Instead of the more common house system, pupils at Stonyhurst belong to one of four Lines, each named after a cornerstone of Stonyhurst's history, represented by its symbol and line colour. Pupils stay in their given lines for their entire time at Stonyhurst and this is what instills a lifelong feeling of community, connection, belonging and school pride.



Campion

The Crown of Martyrdom is a reminder of the Line's patron, St. Edmund Campion, the most venerated English Catholic Jesuit Priest who was martyred in 1581.



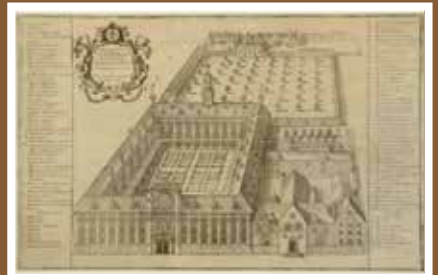
Weld

Thomas Weld, a student of St Omers College, inherited the Stonyhurst Estate from the Shireburn family and donated it to the Jesuits in 1794. The wyvern is drawn from the Weld family crest.



St Omers

The cross is derived from the coat of arms of the town of Saint-Omer, where the original college was founded in 1593 by Father Robert Parsons. The institution ultimately returned to England as Stonyhurst College.

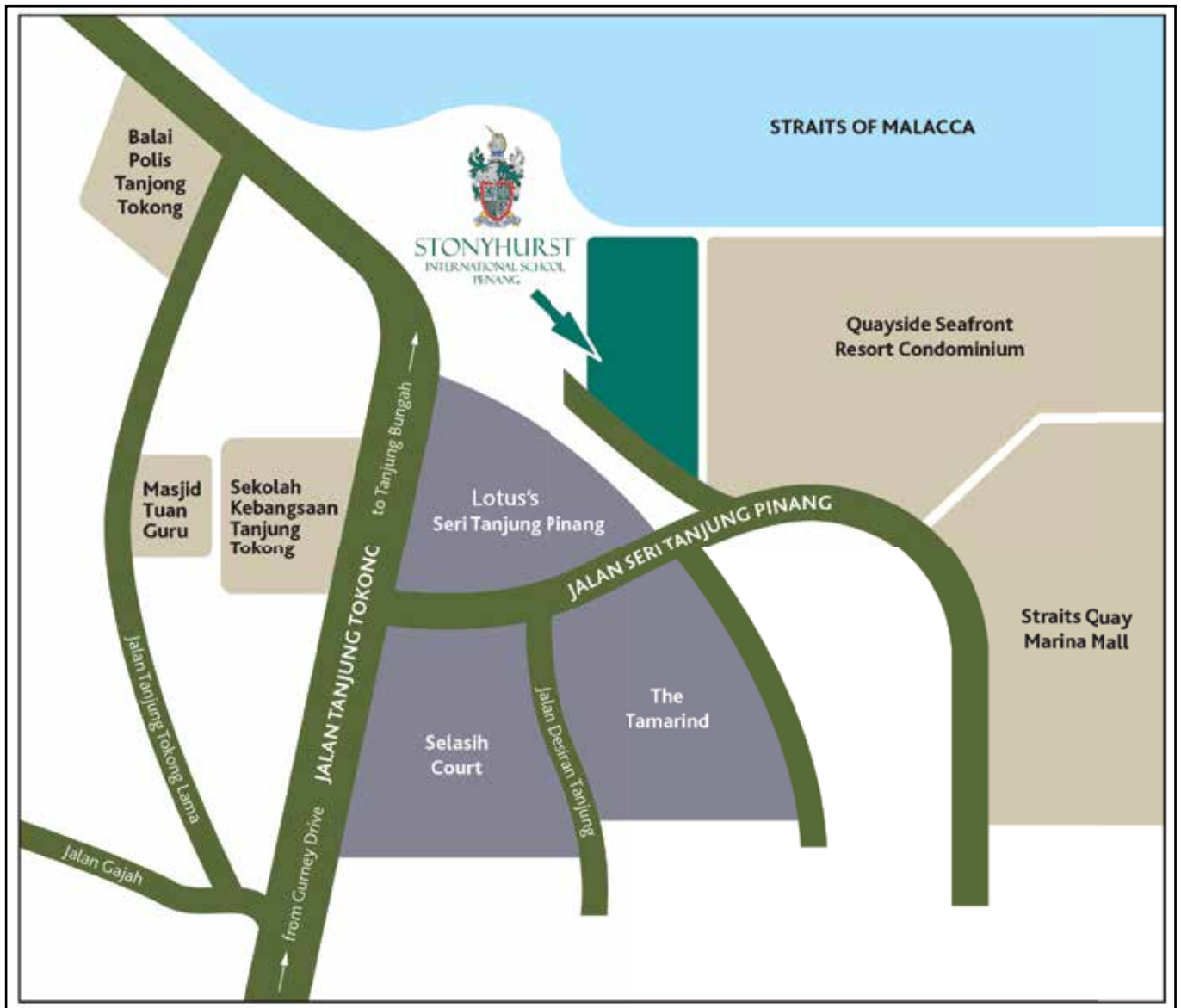


Shireburn

The Shireburn family built the original Shireburn Manor, now known as Stonyhurst Hall, the oldest portion of the school estate. The eagle is taken from the family's coat of arms.
